## Welcome from the Scoutmaster

Thank you for considering Troop 999. We have a very active outdoor program that is designed to provide a series of challenging events, allowing your son to reach new goals, enjoy personal growth, learn new talents and develop his leadership skills in a safe environment.

## Uniforms:

An appropriate uniform, as determined by the Patrol Leaders Council, should be worn to **all** Scout functions, **including weekly meetings**.

1. Scout Uniform Shirt – (Long or Short Sleeve)  
All appropriate patches including current rank.
2. Troop 999 Neckerchief with slide.
3. Scout Pants or Scout Shorts.
4. Merit Badge Sash
5. Order of the Arrow Sash (if earned)
6. Belt
7. Boots, Sneakers, or Closed toed Shoes (No sandals)
8. Hat (optional) if worn must be of Scout Type

## Equipment

Each Patrol is issued a basic set of equipment. This includes: pots, pans, cooking utensils, propane stoves, and other commonly used equipment. Patrols are responsible for their safekeeping and cleanliness.

Each Scout should provide his own sleeping bag, pack or duffel bag as appropriate, eating and drinking utensils, toilet articles and other personal use items as appropriate.

## Tents and Backpacks

Troop 999 provides tents to Scouts on a limited basis. It is suggested that as a Scout progresses in Scouting, they purchase their own tent that fulfills their needs. It is suggested that Scouts consult the Scoutmaster prior to the purchase of any tent. At summer camp, the camp provides campers with BSA canvas wall tents.

Scouts are encouraged to bring their own tent provided that the Scout is familiar with the tent set up and it is appropriate for the type of campout. Note: The Scout is responsible for his own tent.

The Troop has some backpacks for Scouts to use. The Scout should see the Troop Quartermaster if he wishes to use one of the Troop backpacks. Please consult the Scoutmaster prior to the purchase of any backpack. There are many types, some of which are not adequate for our use.

## General Information:

Boy Scout Troop 999 is part of the Harford District, Baltimore Area Council of the Boy Scouts of America. The Chartered Organization for Troop 999 is the Knights of Columbus, Bel Air Council #4714. Troop 999 is re-chartered each year in January. Troop 999 operates under all guidelines, policies, and regulations set forth by the Boy Scouts of America. No boy shall be excluded from Troop 999 for reasons of race, religion, creed, or physical handicap.

## Troop Meetings

The Troop meets weekly at the Knights of Columbus, 23 Newport Drive, Forest Hill, Maryland on Wednesdays from 7 PM to approximately 8:30 PM- after the chairs and tables have been set up for the KOC Bingo games.

## Adult Leaders

Adult Troop Leaders are trained by the BSA in Leadership fundamentals, Health and Safety, Safety Afloat and Swim Fundamentals. Specific leadership responsibilities can be found in the "Troop Committee Guide Book."

## Youth Protection

The safety of our boys is the most important of all responsibilities. Boy Scouts of America now requires that **ALL ADULTS** must take "Youth Protection" **prior** to submitting an adult application. This course is available on-line at <http://scouting.org/>

## The Patrol Leaders Council (PLC)

This council is responsible for planning and conducting the Troop activities. The Troop's activities are selected and planned at the Annual Program Planning Conference. The Troop's yearly plan is then submitted to the Troop Committee for approval. The Troop Committee either approves the plan or makes alternative suggestions to the Patrol Leaders Council to consider at its monthly meetings. The Patrol Leaders Council organizes and assigns activity responsibilities for the weekly Troop meetings. The Troop Committee interacts with the Patrol Leaders Council through the Scoutmaster. Because the PLC determines the course of the Troop, our Troop is considered "Boy Run."
