Global Esthetics






An assessment of dental esthetics begins, quite simply, with the smile. If the images we are so intently evaluating are of beauty and healthy teeth, then the frame that encircles these players on the stage are the soft tissue of the supporting structures, the lips, and their orientation in the face. Global esthetics focuses on these criteria which are observed in unretracted smiles: how the smile orients to the face.

Criteria that constitute the global esthetic parameters are the:

- Smile Line
- Midline
- Incisal Edge Position
- Incisal Plane
- Buccal Corridor

Macro Esthetics



As we begin to narrow our study of the elements of smile design beyond the components related to the orientation of the smile in the face and how it is enveloped by the soft tissue, our focus shifts toward the elements of macro esthetics. Macro esthetics relates to the shape and contours of teeth. Understanding the importance of these contours within the functional matrix will help to ensure a predictable esthetic outcome.

Micro Esthetics

As we continue to concentrate on the details necessary to replicate nature, our next focus is micro esthetics. Micro esthetics are those criteria related to the subtle intricacies of shade, textures, translucencies, and surface effects that make teeth look like teeth. These aid us in fooling the eye and allowing restorations to blend invisibly into the smile.

AACD Accreditation

The Accreditation process, which was developed by the American Academy of Cosmetic Dentistry and is the world's most recognized advanced cosmetic dentistry credentialing program, encourages further education, interaction with like-minded colleagues, and the opportunity for professional growth. Accreditation requires dedication to continuing education and responsible patient care.



The AACD Accreditation Process

1. WRITTEN EXAMINATION

- Apply for and take the written examination at Annual AACD Scientific Session or at a Castle Testing Center
- After passing, the five-year time period begins
- Attend the two required workshops:
 - Accreditation Workshop
 - Criteria Workshop
- Written examination and two required courses must be successfully completed prior to submitting clinical cases, but do not need to be completed in any particular order.

2. SUBMISSION OF CLINICAL CASES

The Required Case Types

There are five case types that dentisits must successfully complete and three cases for laboratory technicians. These cases will allow the individual pursuing Accreditation to demonstrate excellence in a range of disciplines that cover important aspects of cosmetic dentistry.

- **I.** Six or More Indirect Restorations (treating upper incisors and canines)
- **II.** One or Two Indirect Restorations (treating upper incisors*; adjacent teeth must have no indirect restorations) *Edentulous space and or implant does not qualify as treating upper incisors.
- **III.** Tooth Replacement (options: laboratory fabricated bridge or implant)

- **IV.** Class IV Direct Resin Restoration: Replacing at least 10% of the facial surface (treating upper incisors). Options: Class IV or diastema closure.
- **V.** Six or More Direct Resin Veneers (treating upper incisors and canines) (technique case)

After all clinical cases have passed, candidate receives invitation to oral examination

3. ORAL EXAMINATION

The Accreditation Oral Examination is an opportunity for the candidate to verify and authenticate passed casework and treatment planning abilities. The candidate may be asked questions about case selection, diagnosis and treatment planning, or materials and techniques on any of their passed clinical case submissions. Knowledge should clearly demonstrate a familiarity and understanding of these cases. The candidate will also be presented with information regarding a pre-selected case. Adequate time will be allowed for the individual to formulate a treatment plan, which will then be shared and discussed. Additional questions may be asked that cover related topics considered relevant by the examiners.






Clinical Tip #1

Shade Selection

- Quality photography is essential!
- Make sure shade tab lines up with the tooth being photographed
- Polarized lenses help visualize anatomy
- Black and white photos are useful for evaluating value





Clinical Tip #2

Composite


- Choose a composite that works best in YOUR hands
- Be knowledgeable of characterization tints and opaquers but use SPARINGLY
- Do not over polish; restore the natural anatomy and luster of the dentition



Clinical Tip #3

Anterior Crowns and Veneers

- Laboratory communication is CRITICAL
- Patient communication is even more CRITICAL
- Whenever possible, leave your preparation in enamel to ensure the strongest possible bond strength
