Editor Derick Giwner goes through each of the Dan Patch Award divisional races from 2024 with stats, facts and analysis



EDITOR'S EYE

Shortly after you read this column the 2024 Dan Patch Award ballots will reach the email inboxes of voters. While there are some mildly difficult decisions to make, the majority of the horse awards won't require any thought at all.

In the 4-year-old and older ranks, Twin B Joe Fresh, Jiggy Jog, Abuckabett Hanover and Winner's Bet are going to win. The only slight conversation could occur on Winner's Bet since Periculum earned more and Logan Park won more, but judging by the final Top 10 poll vote and considering the overall résumés of the participants, Winner's Bet should win out in the

The 3-year-old awards are a bit more interesting in that each category except for the filly pacer award - where My Girl EJ should easily prevail - has two good candidates for the honor. Voters must decide between Sig Sauer and Karl for colt trotter, R Melina and Allegiant for filly trotter and Captain Albano and Nijinsky on the colt pacing front. Below is the tale of the tape on those matchups:

ANALYSIS: While I couldn't fault anyone for choosing either horse, the slight edge for me goes to Sig Sauer because of the number of stakes he won. There is no more important race in terms of breeding potential and history than the Hambletonian but one major stakes win does not equal year-end honors. It's a shame Karl got sick at the end of the year and couldn't have boosted his résumé even further. He proved to be an exceptional horse but Sig Sauer had the more well-rounded year.

MIKI AND MINNIE dominated her 2-year-old pacing filly division with decisive victories in the Breeders Crown final, Kentucky Sire Stakes Championship Final, a division of the Bluegrass, and the Three Diamonds season finale, winning in a stakes record-equaling 1:49.2. With six wins and four seconds in 11 seasonal starts, the daughter of ALWAYS B MIKI danced every dance and skipped away with \$834,086 in earnings, making her the season's <u>richest</u> freshmen pacer, regardless of sex.

ANALYSIS: Entering the Breeders Crown this division was R Melina's to lose. All she had to do was win the Breeders Crown or Matron . . . or just not have Allegiant win both. That evened the playing field out in a major way and when both showed up versus older foes in the FanDuel, a good performance by either could've been a difference maker, and it was for me. Allegiant was a very good second timed in 1:50 1/5 while R Melina broke early in the mile.

Analysis: This matchup is fairly even from my perspective with the exception of the "stakes won" category where Captain Albano has a huge edge. While you could argue that Nijinsky's North America Cup win ranks first on the scale of importance, Captain Albano's Jug, Hempt and Adios victories are easily second through fourth in terms of importance. There is the point that Captain Albano didn't win a major stake on a "big track" but then you could say Nijinsky didn't win on a five-eighths or half-mile track. I have to give my vote to Captain Albano while applauding the year from Nijinsky.

Moving onto the 2-year-old divisions, we have what should be a unanimous winner in colt trotter Maryland and a near-lock to get the pacing colt title in Breeders Crown winner Louprint. Divisional honors in both of the filly categories is likely to be much more interesting. Let's go to the stats first.

Analysis: The big question here is whether an undefeated season that doesn't include leaving your home track is enough. Make no mistake, Chantilly was awesome in 2024 and in most years I would give her my vote, but what Miki And Minnie accomplished in the Crown and Three Diamonds – coming first-over and proving much the best – pushed her over the top in my book. Of course, Chantilly is ranked fifth in the industry top 10 poll and Miki And Minnie isn't on the list, so I may be against the grain. All I can say is to re-watch the Breeders Crown.

Analysis: There really is no clear leader in this division. My gut says that Champagne Problems will win based on having the most money earned and most wins, but without question Lady Landia won the most important race and Monalishi is no slouch either. This is the one category where I could still change my mind but Champagne Problems has my vote today.

Now that we've covered all of the 12 divisional races we are left with Pacer, Trotter and Horse of the Year. While she won't be unanimous, Twin B Joe Fresh will win the Pacer and Horse of the Year awards in a landslide. That leaves a decision on the best trotter. Here is the breakdown:

Analysis: You'll notice fewer categories above and that is because it is hard to compare an older trotting mare to a 2-year-old trotting colt. Jiggy Jog being undefeated is going to lure many people in and rightfully so. She also defeated the boys in most of her races. Maryland led all horses in earnings this year, and that is a huge feather in his cap, especially considering that he had the third-richest season by a 2-year-old trotter in history. Both horses get a ton of credit for racing and winning at multiple tracks. So how do we separate them? I'm digging deep into the competition lines to examine how each horse won and who they faced.

Maryland was an easy winner in three of his stakes and also showed a gutsy side in winning the Breeders Crown and Kindergarten. While we won't know for sure until this time next year, I felt the group he faced was at least above average and perhaps exceptional. By contrast, Jiggy Jog really didn't face much in the older trotting ranks from my view. The international competition at Yonkers as well as the domestic horses from these shores were average at best. Yes, she dominated, but what did she really beat? That being said, if she would've remained sound through the end of November and picked up wins in the Breeders Crown and FanDuel, she would've gotten my vote, but when you look at Jiggy Jog's overall body of work versus Maryland I feel it came up just short.

Let me conclude by congratulating all of the horses mentioned above on a wonderful year of racing. While some of them will not walk away with Dan Patch Award trophies, it was a pleasure to watch them race in 2024, and for those that are returning to the races next year, here's hoping the best is still yet to come.





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Highland Kismet will seek to make his mark as a 4YO in 2025

There's going to be a brand new division of horses racing in 2025 for the top prizes for open trotters. A slew of voluntary and forced retirements has assured that next year's premier races will likely be filled with new horses and first-time winners. The times have changed and with them so have the faces, and the likes of top sophomores Sig Sauer, Karl and T C I moving on to stallion duty help thin out an older division that is likely to be somewhat decimated with the loss of 2024 stars Jiggy Jog S and Winner's Bet.

As is the case most often in this sport, what some see as a loss others see as a gain and that could leave room for some would-be stars to emerge on the scene in races wider open than they have been in years. While those trotters with speed and breeding options have fled the racing wars, others without a second option will remain and one has a lot to prove to his owner, trainer and driver in 2025.

Highland Kismet did not start his sophomore season with the same outlook that the connections of 2023 millionaires Karl and T C I did. The gelded son of Father Patrick had run out of options to make the races as a freshman and was given to trainer Mark Etsell as a final chance to make the grade.

"I thought best early on that if we stake him for later in the season, we'd have a chance," said Etsell, who saw promise in the horse but had a sense of realism that wouldn't allow him to dream too big too early.

Highland Kismet did have ownership that was able to back dreams with stakes payments and that made him eligible to the year's most lucrative races, including the Hambletonian. Highland Kismet's early success would make that dream possible, but the road was far from perfect and the class of horses he would eventually meet up with in the last few weeks of July and first Saturday in August were far different than what he had faced and dominated in his native Ontario.

"It's tough to race a 3-year-old that didn't race at 2 against horses that have," said Etsell. "The way I see it, it's the same as taking a kid that's playing High School basketball and putting him into the NBA. It's an entirely different game."

Quite often what the betting public sees on the racetrack is far different from what the trainer experiences with a horse, and in the case of Highland Kismet, Etsell had his hands full throughout the year.

"He would just do stupid things," said Etsell, pointing out the key issues during the year.

Translated into layman's terms, Highland Kismet would make breaks in stride at inopportune times and sometimes without warning. The trait in a trotter working his way up the class ladder can be common, yet driving a horse of this caliber in stakes races make the game that much more challenging for driver and trainer.

With the Hambletonian, perhaps no race this year pointed to Highland Kismet's incredible ability while at the same time showcasing the predicament a driver could face when \$1 million was on the line. The Hambletonian had numerous twists and turns in 2024 and none of them had Etsell resting too easily as he sent his horse to the track.

"At first it was just a little rain and the track was holding up well," said Etsell. "Then right as they went to the gait it started pouring and I was just holding my breath."

Highland Kismet's nine rivals all had the experience edge over him and the ability to adjust to the conditions, leaving the race in the capable hands of Bob McClure who had already won the sport's premier event five years ago with Forbidden Trade.

McClure was able to keep Highland Kismet on stride and gain position in the opening quarter, and then left with few options had to go up without cover early to have any chance.

"I was feeling pretty good when I saw him get to T C I on the final turn and then go by him in the stretch," said Etsell. "It's just that when he gets to the front he starts waiting on horses."

Etsell knew at that moment that it was a question of when the finish line would finally arrive because McClure had the unenviable task of keep-

ing Highland Kismet engaged enough to hold off the closers while not seeing him make a break in stride and losing any chance at victory.

"That's a long stretch," Etsell said looking back on that day as the final yards seemed like they would never arrive. In the end they did, and Karl was able to get the job done as the public choice.

"Bob came back after the race and said he was sorry," said Etsell. "I said what are you sorry about? You just won a \$500,000 race."

For Etsell just making the Hambletonian was a longshot, but the outcome may have been better than anyone could have expected.

"I would say that was definitely his best race of the year," Etsell said of the Hambletonian

There were plenty of low points along the way that built frustrations, like a break in the Canadian Trotting Classic final for no reason and a suicidal speed mission in the Kentucky Futurity that would lead the connections to move to Tim Tetrick to drive Highland Kismet in the Breeders Crown and Matron.

Etsell continued to point out his challenges getting a horse to do things properly when they appear to lack the capacity to learn.

"He's just not a very smart horse," said Etsell, who knew even at year's end that challenges remain.

"Look at the Matron," Etsell said. "Timmy (Tetrick) had him on the lead and he was going well, then on the last turn he just took himself out of the race. He had raced on the mile and seven-eighths mile tracks all year and they were once around and the race was over. I think in the Matron Highland Kismet thought the race was over and was pulling himself up. There was nothing Tim could do."

Etsell had experienced many of the highs and lows along the way and remains positive and even-keel. "If you asked me to describe his year I would say bittersweet," Etsell said.

While many of his rivals will look to prove themselves on a separate stage in 2025, Highland Kismet could become a dominant force against 4-year-olds and older rivals next year.

"He's in Kentucky resting," said Etsell of Highland Kismet, who will come back to him in 2025 to prepare for the stakes season. "We'll map out a schedule in February for him."

Highland Kismet's blistering speed needs to be controlled and a lot of what happens next year will depend on whether he can adapt and become more focused and reliable on the track.

"I'm hoping he fills out a little bit and matures," said Etsell, who philosophized that girls mature faster than boys so maybe change is imminent.

When Highland Kismet returns to Etsell's stable he'll join his younger half-brother Highland Destiny, a son of Greenshoe.

"He's smarter," Etsell said when asked to compare the soon-to-be 2-year-old with Highland Kismet.

"If you told me in March that he was going to win the Goodtimes and

Simcoe I would have said it's going to be a great year," said Etsell.

Looking forward, Etsell has no doubt that Highland Kismet has sub-1:50 speed in his profile. The challenge will be to see him more focused and better equipped to handle the complexity of racing seasoned horses in

Historic season at Saratoga comes to a close for "Team Beckwith" and others

The 2024 season at the Saratoga Harness Track is drawing to a close with a timeline of milestones and records left in its wake at the Upstate New York half-mile oval. With 151 live race dates, the meet ran from early February to mid-December with thousands of races contested.

Highlighting the conclusion of the Saratoga year was the award ceremony to honor the Trainer and Driver of the Year winners, Mark and Brett Beckwith, respectively. For the first time in the track's history, a father-son duo swept the leaderboard at the Spa.

Mark Beckwith, a New England native, had a career year overall with 220 winners and \$1.85 million banked. At Saratoga, however, he set an all-time record to become the winningest trainer in the history of the track after he sent out 182 winners and took home \$1.21 million in purse earnings over 576 starts.

"I found out earlier in the year what the record by Colin Johnson was and made it my mission to try and break it," Mark Beckwith said.

With his record season came his first training title at the track and he was able to share it with his son Brett.

"To be able to win it with my son as leading driver is a dream come true," Mark said. "But make no mistake about it, without the support of the people that work with me and my family and the best owners a trainer could want, none of this would be possible."

On June 23, Mark set the seasonal best for most wins in a card with five wins, all piloted by Brett.

Mark Beckwith maintained a stable of around 20 head throughout the year with horses racing at Saratoga Casino Hotel and Plainridge Park. Between himself, his wife Melissa, Brett, and his grooms and riders, the team harnessed up many winners while keeping a tight operation and an immaculate stable. Now, several of his trainees are on the ballot for Saratoga year-end awards, to be decided on January 4 at the annual banquet.

On the driving side, Brett Beckwith was a clear winner on the leader-board, stepping away with an over 60-win lead as he has made north of 300 trips to the winner's circle, producing \$2.36 million in seasonal earnings.

"It's an honor. I grew up here watching my dad drive so to be able to take the reins from him and both of us be the top dogs is something out of a fairytale," Brett said.

The 21-year-old reinsman finished second last year by one point in the polls for the USHWA Rising Star title after becoming the youngest to achieve \$4 million in a season and winning 452 races. This year, in his sixth year of driving, Brett has since magnified his stats and standings. With 585 wins to date and nearly \$6 million earned, Brett sits third in the national rankings behind Aaron Merriman and Jason Bartlett on the win end.

There were multiple days in which Brett scored five or more wins on a single card, including full weekends where he swept with five wins each day. On July 13, Brett equaled the all-time Saratoga record for most wins in a single card with eight, tying Hall of Fame driver Frank Coppola Jr.

Driving across the northeast throughout the year, Brett has made starts at Freehold Raceway, Tioga Downs, Yonkers Raceway and The Meadowlands, in addition to driving full-time at Saratoga and Plainridge Park. Not only did Brett lead the rankings at Saratoga, but he shared the driving title at Plainridge with Bruce Ranger as the co-leading drivers.

"There's been so many fun moments and memories but [the best] probably would be the Mass Sire Stakes Final with my dad's horse or the night I won eight [at Saratoga], everything was just flowing that whole night," Brett said.

Next year, Brett has raised his goals again and hopes to continue with the success he has had.

"I just want to keep the ball rolling, but for next year I want to grab a couple higher purse wins and maybe get a crack at the Gerrity again," he added.

Closing on Brett for the driving title with a quick surge during his stint at the Spa for the season was Wally Hennessey. A member of five different Halls of Fame (PEI, Canada, Florida, Saratoga and Goshen), Hennessey is no stranger to the spotlight and headlines. He arrived at Saratoga in May, three months after the start of the meet, and wasted little time in rising through the ranks. He rattled off five and six winners on multiple cards, reaching seven winners on May 13.

On September 30, the 66-year-old reinsman piloted six straight winners as the most consecutive number of wins by a driver at the Spa and then later added one more to make another seven-win score for his seasonal-best tally.

"I learned a long time ago as a catch driver, your destination is not in your hands but in the relationships you develop with the owners, trainers and grooms," Hennessey said. "It's with them, having the opportunity and being prepared to accept and adapt to each race as it comes. The main thing is the standardbred horse, who is and always will be my main purpose for why I continue to work with each one. They are amazing individuals with different talents and traits. They for sure make your life complete if you have the passion."

Despite his three month late start and his dismemberment a month prior to the conclusion of the meet, Hennessey racked up 238 winners over 874 starts with the highest UDR of .420 of the top 20 drivers. Adding in his \$1.72 million accumulated, Hennessey topped the standings in second.

"The success this year was a combination of getting to drive for the leading trainers and just trying to give everybody the best possible result, and as always, having to have great luck and always keeping your

confidence whether results are good or bad, because without confidence your longevity is pretty short," Hennessey said.

Hennessey's success at Saratoga in the 2024 meet propelled him into the top 10 for national all-time winningest drivers. He is now 129 wins shy of the 12,000-win milestone.

Overall, Saratoga produced a record handle for the track with \$714,997 wagered on the May 5 card.

The track also saw a record amount of money raised for the annual $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right)$

Charity Match Race that was showcased on Saturday, July 27. The event merged the thoroughbred and standardbred racing worlds together as Brett Beckwith drove against prolific jockey Robbie Davis and harness trainer/driver/RUS rider Michelle Crawford rode in a RUS-style race against jockey Katie Davis. The grandstand was packed with the highest number of fans in attendance for an event in the year and over \$20,000 was raised for two local charities: the Franklin Community Center and Kelly's Angels.

A week prior to that huge event was the marquee race of the Saratoga meet with the \$250,000 Joe Gerrity Jr. Memorial and Jason Bartlett made history as the first driver to win twice in the 15 years since the race's installment. Bartlett steered Coaches Corner to a 1:49 3/5 mile for trainer Per Engblom as the fourth-fastest mile in Saratoga's history.

As for the horsemen, the milestones kept on rolling with Jaymes Mcassey reaching 500 training wins, Gary Levine and Scott Mongeon reaching 1,000 training wins, Matty Athearn and Brett Beckwith reaching \$10 million, Wally Hennessey passing \$80 million, Brett Beckwith achieving 1,000 driving wins, and Jay Randall notching 5,000 driving wins.

With many races dedicated to career recognition, milestones, and records for horse and horsemen, Saratoga Casino Hotel produced a historic season in 2024.



Harris pair seek \$250K prize in MGM Grand Prix at Yonkers

The newly christened MGM Grand Prix Pacing Series has its \$250,000 final on Monday (December 16). Following three preliminary legs the final eight will vie for the largest purse offered this month in Yonkers Raceway's history. Trainer Andrew Harris has collected a large ensemble of top older pacers led by likely division champion Abuckabett Hanover. On Monday he'll send out stablemates Seven Colors and El Rey with an eye on the top prize in the lucrative event.

"Kudos to Joe Frasure for putting this series together," said Harris following Tuesday's draw for the final. "I think it's a great addition to the stakes schedule.'

The MGM Grand Prix has been quite eventful over the three elimination rounds with the first two legs raced on November 4 and 11 and then the final preliminary contested last Monday (December 9). Finding a

place on the busy schedule for older pacers may have been a challenge but Frasure found a seam following the Breeders Crown that allowed the Potomac and FanDuel to take place, and the response was solid. Until last week's third preliminary leg there had been no repeat winners in the first six races. Only Coaches Corner (post 7) was able to capture two of the three legs of the series.

In Monday's finale, all the eight horses captured a prelim and that sets the stage for a great event with the horses needing to go the mile and a sixteenth distance to earn the championship. Harris' pair of pacers found the luck of the draw to their benefit, with Seven Colors landing post two and El Rey post four in the field that goes as race eight on a Monday program that also features a \$10,000 seeded Pick 5 pool and \$40,000 guarantee starting in race five.

"Seven Colors has started to come around in his last five races," said Harris. "We've had some issues with his blood through the middle of the season that held him back."

Following a solid sophomore season where the Harris connections picked up the son of Stay Hungry towards the end of the campaign, Seven Colors has been limited to just three wins in 18 tries this season. Harris' stable finished one-two in the \$600,000 Breeders Crown at The Meadowlands on October 26 with Seven Colors following home Abuckabett Hanover. In three legs of the series Seven Colors followed up a second and third in the first two legs with a dominating score in last week's final elimination leg.

"You know that's his kind of trip," said Harris, referring to the firstover journey driver Jason Bartlett sent Seven Colors on. "That's not always the preferred trip getting over this track but it's the one that works best for him.'

The win assured Seven Colors a spot in the final and the draw gave him post two, inside many of his chief rivals in the contest. Scott Zeron will pick up the drive with Jason Bartlett opting for the likely favorite Coaches Corner for the final.

"Scott will get along with him fine," said Harris.

Harris didn't have as much confidence in El Rey following Tuesday's draw but that was easy to understand.

"He just raced last night and we're waiting on bloodwork to come back," said Harris, still trying to assess El Rey's sixth-place finish.

A winner in the opening leg of the series on November 4, El Rev pulled from third to challenge in Monday's race and backed up on the final turn. Harris has called on young Brett Beckwith to guide El Rey from post four

Though drawing inside Coaches Corner, Harris wasn't certain that would be as big an edge as perceived.

"With the added distance to the first turn Coaches Corner can get out quickly," Harris said, recognizing the combination of Bartlett's timing and Coaches Corner's quick foot as a competitive advantage for the opposing team.

Coaches Corner may not need extra help, as he proved winning for the second time in the series last week, controlling the action for Bartlett. One of two entries from leading trainer Per Engblom's stable, Coaches Corner joins stablemate Adam Twelve (post 3). Adam Twelve was used a bit in the early stages last week for driver Yannick Gingras and faded to

fourth in the stretch. The 4-year-old could outsprint rivals to his inside in the final in search of a stalking trip this week.

Outside of the solid couples from Harris and Engblom there are four others in the field looking for major upsets, with Typhoon Banner N (post 5) the most logical of the quartet. Trainer Joe Bongiorno appears to have this import peaking for the final following last week's authoritative score. An 8-year-old by Bettor's Delight, Typhoon Banner N has won eight times in his first full year for the Bongiorno stable. Matt Kakaley will drive Typhoon Banner N.

Nandolo N makes his 37th start of 2024 and may be perfectly spotted having drawn post one with Lauren Tritton in the bike. Battle tested, Nandolo N could benefit if the pace gets too contested.

American Dealer N (post 6) and Whats Stanley Got A (post 8) round out the exceptional field.

Harris said this will be the final race for both of his horses this season and he doesn't anticipate either will be ready in time for the 2025 Borgata Series at Yonkers in the spring.

"I just think that series is too tough on horses," Harris said. "I'm going to point them for the Grand Circuit races."

The Monday card at Yonkers Raceway kicks off at 7:00 PM (ET) and features 11 races.

Hart, Sir Pinocchio, New York horses honored by USHWA

Beloved harness horse trainer Eddie Hart looked out at the capacity crowd of well-wishers at Sunday (Dec. 8) night's 65th Awards Banquet of the Monticello-Goshen Chapter of the United States Harness Writers Association (USHWA), presented by the New York Sire Stakes, and said, "Me and my buddy Tom Manza took the BOCES harness class in high school over 50 years ago."

"And I am still here," stated the trainer of this year's USTA District 8 Horse of the Year, Sir Pinocchio.

Hart, whose charges have earned over \$23 million, gave the life-long conditioner a long list of people that he was thankful for.

"Jeff Cohen flew up from Florida just to be here tonight," Hart stated, "and I am very grateful for that." For Cohen, Hart trained Four Starzzzz Shark, a top open pacer. Hart also trained Space Shuttle for Bob Hiemstra, Roll With Joe for Blue Chip Farms, et al, and had a plethora of horses for top owners like Jeff Snyder and Mannie Halbert.

"But most of all I have to thank my wife Jeannine for sticking with me and the horses for all these years," which prompted the crowd to their feet, once again.

Known for his integrity, professionalism and horsemanship, Hart often shies away from the spotlight, but anyone present could feel the mutual admiration and respect that filled the room.

Although the Monticello-Goshen Chapter was tasked with presenting all of the New York Sire Stakes, Excelsior Series and County Fair Awards, along with the US Trotting Association's District 8 Awards, the night very much belonged to Eddie and the connections of Sir Pinocchio.

For the owners and breeders of the Yonkers Trot and NY Sire Stakes Championship-winning 3-year-old son of Met's Hall, Carolyn and Irv Atherton were both honored with individual awards. Carolyn was the recipient of the Cradle of the Trotter Breeders Award, and her husband Irv received the Amy Bull Crist Distinguished Service Award for his twenty years of service to the sport and Goshen Historic Track.

Sir Pinocchio's driver, Jason Bartlett, was feted with both the New York Sire Stakes and USTA District 8 Driver of the Year award.

The USHWA chapter's second highest honor, the John Manzi Leadership Award, went to Steve Jones for his work as trustee with the Agriculture and New York State Horse Breeding Fund in securing a record purse structure for the New York Sire Stakes program for 2025. Jones, the proprietor of his family-operated Cameo Hills Farm, glossed over all of his other 'dollara-year' jobs. The third generation horseman is also president of Goshen Historic Track and sits on the board of the Harness Racing Museum & Hall of Fame, the Hambletonian Society, and the Grand Circuit.

The writers also honored Kim Crawford with the Excelsior Award for his dedication and contributions to harness racing in New York State. A former driver, trainer and owner, Crawford now dons the tools of trackman and is also a USTA Director. A staunch advocate for horsemen throughout the state, he puts his time and efforts into ensuring that our NY racing surfaces are the best they can be.

Heather Reese-Marshall received the chapter's John Gilmour Good 'Gal' Award for her yeoman's work foaling, raising and selling champion Crawford Farms' stars such as Hambletonian winner Karl and Kentucky Futurity winner Sig Sauer. In addition, Michelle Crawford was on hand to accept the Breeder of the Year award from the New York Sire Stakes and USTA District 8.

In addition Jessica Otten, harness racing analyst and TV personality received the chapter's Phil Pines, along with Tyler 'TJ' Miller who got the group's Rising Star Award.

Aside from hosting nationally prominent honorees, the awards banquet still maintains its 'Borscht Belt' roots. Since 1959 the Monticello-Goshen chapter has been rewarding the local horsemen and women that compete at the 'Mighty M,' as well as the hard-working staff and management that keep the races rolling.

The Mighty M Award of Appreciation was bestowed upon Dale Berenson for her 35-years of dedication to the Monticello Harness Horsemen's Association. President Alan Schwartz made a poignant introduction while Ms. Berenson was given a lengthy standing ovation for her tireless efforts on behalf of all the local horse people.

Andrew Adamczyk was this year's Amateur Driver of the Year, with long-time track announcer Howard Oil ad-libbing a race call while a replay was shown on two big screens, much to the delight of all in attendance. These folks, and others from around the region, received their

awards along with their peers for the sixty-plus divisional equine honors bestowed upon the hard-working owners, trainers and caretakers that call New York State, and the Sullivan County oval home.

Just after the dinner break a 'bidding war' of sorts broke out among several of the golf aficionados that were in attendance that evening. When the dust settled Jared Bako emerged as the successful live auction purchaser of a foursome at the Monster Golf Course, compliments of Resorts World Catskills. Following the melee, Bako said, "I hate to lose!" The Bako Racing Team had an entire table of staff and horse people on hand to collect all the hardware they won for horses such as The Last Martini and Fast Choice.

With revenue from their loyal advertisers in the 88-page souvenir journal, the Monticello-Goshen Chapter of USHWA is able to raise enough funds to donate thousands of dollars every year to the Harness Racing Museum & Hall of Fame, as well as Goshen Historic Track. These two distinct, separate entities share the same hallowed ground and a singleness of purpose to preserve, protect and promote harness racing.

The practice of raising money and donating funds to Historic Track and the Hall of Fame began in the mid-1970s with Monticello Raceway publicity icon John Manzi, and has continued ever since. In just the last 25 years, the local Monticello-Goshen chapter has donated well over \$160,000 to these important industry preservationists.

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Pick 6 Carryover at Big M Thursday

While it's true that last Thursday's (Dec. 5) 10-race program at The Meadowlands didn't offer stakes-caliber racing, what it did provide is what many players love: Racing that is ultra-competitive where bettors can make a big score, like the one that came when the 20-cent Pick-5 returned \$28,712,22.

Tonight (Thursday, Dec. 12), The Big M will offer the second of two Thursday cards on the 2024 calendar.

In addition to the Thursday Pick-5, The Meadowlands was the place for big fields and big payoffs last weekend.

During the course of the Thursday card, seven favorites tasted defeat, setting up payouts that no doubt pleased those with winning tickets. The Early 50-cent Pick-4 returned \$4,030.50, the Late Pick-5 \$580.55 and the 20-cent Pick-6 \$3,634.13.

"Our fans like having a shot at making a score, and last Thursday proves those chances exist," said track Chief Operating Officer and General Manager Jason Settlemoir. "That opportunity will be there again [tonight] when there is a carryover in the Pick-6."

Saturday's (Dec. 7) Pick-6 went unhit, creating a carryover of \$4,038. Now, before you are unimpressed by that number, take note of the following:

If \$20,000 in "new money" is wagered, players will be swimming in a highly appealing pool. After removing the small takeout, the total pool would be \$21,038, meaning winning tickets would pay out more money that what's taken in, a "negative takeout". Simply put, in this scenario, the return would be 5 percent more than the amount that is wagered. Advantage: Player.

The Pick 6 starts in race five and offers a 15 percent takeout.

The Big M's betting menu has many opportunities for players to bet into a pool with a low 15 percent takeout. This puts more money back in the hands of horseplayers. This is illustrated by what the payout would have been before The Meadowlands decreased the takeout by 40 per cent, from 25 to 15 per cent. Clearly, this has helped horseplayers stay in the game.

Last Thursday's Pick-5 returned \$28,712, precisely \$3,378 more with the lower takeout; on Friday, the payout was \$11,938, a little over \$1,400 more than what it would have paid with the higher takeout.

Thursday's Pick-4 came back \$4,030, \$475 more with the lower takeout, while on Saturday, the giant payoff of \$25,609 was more than \$3,000 better.

The Pick-6 on Thursday paid \$4,275, \$503 more than if the higher takeout was still in effect.

The payout on the 20-cent Survivor Pick-7 on Friday was \$5,478, which meant an extra \$645 in someone's Christmas stocking.

Finally, the Thursday 10-cent Pentafecta (or Hi-5, if you prefer), paid off \$3,379, approximately \$400 more.

"We here at The Meadowlands understand that giving the horseplayers a beatable game is crucial to a successful business model," said Settlemoir. "With large fields, competitive racing, low takeouts and situational negative or near-negative takeouts, we have created the gambling landscape that gives horseplayers a much better chance to win."

BIG FIELDS, BIG OPPORTUNITIES: Cold weather be damned!

The Meadowlands will once again offer big fields all weekend (Dec.

On Thursday, the average field size is 9.7, Friday is 9.9 and Saturday is 9.5. There will be 38 races contested at The Big M over the three days, and 31 of them will offer full 10-horse fields (82 per cent).

MUCH APPRECIATED: On Saturday, Dec. 28, head to The Meadowlands for Fan Appreciation Night.

"We'd like to thank our fans for a fantastic year," said Settlemoir. "And while we are extremely appreciative of our players who bet us on the various simulcast networks, we like letting our on-track faithful know that we love it when they are inside the building."

There will be discounted concessions offered from 6-11 p.m. that night. For just \$1 in the Cafe, one can purchase hot dogs, pretzels, popcorn and soda.

Bud and Bud Light draft, also available at the Café, will be just \$2.

The Pick 5, along with the Pick 7, will feature an 80% major/20% minor pool payout with an 80% carryover if no correct tickets are sold.

If there are no correct Pick 4 tickets, 90% will carrryover and 10% will be distributed to the most winners.

The 20-cent Hi 5, which will be conducted on the final race each night, will have a 100% carryover if no correct tickets is sold.

Looking at the stakes schedule, there will be a total of \$420,000 distributed in the California Sire Stakes with \$230,000 earmarked for the late closing events

The May 2 Closing night program will feature a pair of \$50,000 races for the 4-year-old pacing colts and geldings and the 4-year-old pacing fillies.
