

FORMER CHAMPIONS BATTLE IN ELITLOPPET

Solvalla Racecourse in Stockholm, Sweden is set to host many of the world's top trotters in the 2025 edition of the Elitlopp on Sunday (May 25). The Elitlopp will go in a same-day elimination/ final format, with the top four finishers from each elimination in races six and seven moving on to the final in race 11. The Elitlopp eliminations and final are one mile races from behind a starting car.

While 2024 champion Horsy Dream is not entered, the winners of the 2021, 2022 and 2023 Elitlopps are all set to compete. The 2022 champion is Etonnant, who has post one in the opening elimination for driver Anthony Barrier and owner/trainer Richard Westerink. The son of Timoko, the winner of the 2017 Elitlopp, was a regular at the top level across the world, including two appearances in the MGM Yonkers International Trot in 2022 and 2023, but the 11-year-old made just one start in 2024 due to some physical issues that popped up.

"It was all in his muscles. We didn't know what he had. He was sick, but we couldn't find it," Westerink offered. "Now the horse is good. He's in good shape and in great form, so we put him in the race again."

Etonnant's prep races included a second in the Group 1 Grand Critérium de Vitesse de la Côte d'Azur at Cagnes-sur-Mer on March 9 and a fourth in the Group 2 Prix Kerjacques at Vincennes on April 5. He did tire in a sixth-place finish in his last outing in the Group 1 Prix de L'Atlantique on

elitloppet[®] 25 Solvalla may 23-25



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April 19 at Enghien, but Westerink wasn't discouraged by that performance.

"He raced very well in Cagnessur-Mer and then in Vincennes. Enghien, he was a little bit tired I think. For some time he was not racing and then he raced three times with not a long time between his races," he noted. "Now he's got five weeks in between races, and I think he will be good. In training he worked very, very, very well, so we will see in the race."

While on paper the pole position is a coveted spot on the fiveeighths-mile track, Westerink remarked that it may not be the easiest spot for his horse and that a change in his normal racing style may be needed.

"I think we can win the Elitlopp, but now it's a little bit complicated. There are so many people who want post one in the race, but for Etonnant, behind the gate with post one, it's not so simple I think," he said. "He can make a fast start, but we always take him back because we don't want to take the risk to make a break. I'll talk with Anthony, but I think we must take a little bit more risk. He'll race with the same bridle, otherwise no changes (with his equipment)."

Among the horses that Etonnant will face in his elimination are Francesco Zet, one of the prerace favorites and the fourth-place finisher from 2024's Elitlopp final, Go On Boy, who was third in the 2023 Elitlopp final for trainer/ driver Romain Derieux and then won his elimination last year but broke stride in the final, and multiple Grand Circuit stakes winner Logan Park, who is the lone North American representa-

tive with Doug McNair in to drive the Rob Fellows trainee.

"It was a great draw for him," trainer Daniel Redén stated on his Stall Zet website in regards to Francesco Zet, who landed post two for driver Örjan Kihlström. "He had a (hard training) day on Thursday and a medium training today (Monday). He is moving fantastically well and mentally he is in a different place than he was all last year. He is calmer, so now we will see if he is ready to make it to an Elite race. We have told him to take it easy and now he should not take it easy, so there will be a bit of a double signal, but I think we have him where he should be.

"He raced and waited for the competitors last time. He has never liked to run away from the competitors, but he ran a 1.09 (kilometer) time at Rättvik, and it was quite cold outside, so that was good. Now it will be Norwegian headgear and hood as usual. We will run barefoot in the back and then we will run barefoot all around if he makes it to the final."

In the other elimination, 2023 Elitlopp winner Hohneck, who will be piloted by Gabriele Gelormini for trainer Philippe Allaire and 2021 champion Don Fanucci Zet, another Redén trainee who will be steered by Paul-Philippe Ploquin, are set to meet from posts one and three, respectively. However, the likely favorite in the race is Sweden's Borups Victory from post six for trainer/driver Daniel Wäjersten as the son of Googoo Gaagaa comes in off a victory in the Group 1 Paralympiatravet at Åby on May 4. Borups Victory was also second in last year's Elitlopp final.

"He looks really good, he is happy and alert. He knows these routines and conditions," Redén wrote about Don Fanucci Zet. "It's the first time with Ploquin in Sweden, but Fanucci is quite easy to drive and Ploquin knows old male trotters (race ten). The Delicious features the second outing in Sweden for Allegiant, the 2024 Dan Patch Award winner for top 3-year-old trotting filly in the U.S.

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Harris trio set to roll for Sunday Invitationals in Chester

Trainer Andrew Harris has built a stable of solid older pacers and a pair of them will be on debut Sunday afternoon at Harrah's Philadelphia, with 2024 Dan Patch Award winner Abuckabett Hanover racing in the \$100,000 Joseph Auger Memorial and My Girl EJ meeting 2024 Horse of the Year Twin B Joe Fresh in the \$100,000 Betsy Ross.

"I'm really happy the way Abuckabett has come back," said Harris. "That first qualifier he got excited and worked up before the race and kind of choked a bit. He was much better in the second qualifier, only Sabonis was a bit better. Still, he came home in 25 3/5 and that's not bad."

Abuckabett Hanover, a son of Betting Line, had a brilliant campaign last year winning seven of his 15 starts and seeing career earnings balloon over \$2 million. He returns on Sunday against a solid and more seasoned field of horses, with MGM Borgata series champion Mossdale Ben N (post 7) and the classy Bythemissal (post 4) joining 2024 Auger champion and track-record holder Ruthless Hanover (post 8). The deep field also includes the rugged Coaches Corner (post 1), a three-leg winner in the Borgata that fell victim to post eight in the lucrative final.

As for Abuckabett Hanover in his first start of the year, Harris didn't seem worried. "Generally, he's not at his best racing on the front so the qualifier was really solid," Harris said. "He was exactly the same when we started him last year, with the second qualifier better than the first."

Last year Coaches Corner drew post seven for the Auger and this year he'll be inside, affording driver Jason Bartlett significantly more options.

Bythemissal drew post eight for last year's edition and now finds post four more promising for the Hall of Fame team of trainer Ron Burke and driver Yannick Gingras. Bythemissal started just eight times last year and was the favorite in the Breeders Crown following an impressive effort in the eliminations. This year he enters the Auger following a 1:48 3/5 effort in an Open event at Scioto on May 10.

Despite drawing post eight Ruthless Hanover clearly has an advantage over the Harrah's Philadelphia five-eighths-of-a-mile surface with his brilliant early speed and staying power. An explosive 1:51 qualifier over this surface on May 13 should have him fit enough for competition.

The Auger Memorial goes as race 12 among 16 on the stakes-filled Harrah's Philadelphia program.

Harris sends out My Girl EJ in the \$100,000 Betsy Ross, an Invitational for mares carded as race 13.

"She's come back great," said Harris "It's going to be tough going against Twin B Joe Fresh."

The 4-year-old My Girl EJ already has experience racing against the 2024 Horse of the Year as the two met in last year's Fan Duel at The Meadowlands with the then sophomore filly finishing second behind Twin B Joe Fresh.

"She's a two-time Breeders Crown champion," said Harris. "In the first qualifier there was no reason to do anything but sit behind Twin B Joe Fresh. In the second qualifier she was strong."

My Girl E J won on May 17 at The Meadowlands in 1:50 2/5 with a 26 4/5 final quarter, her final prep for this contest.

The Betsy Ross has My Girl EJ squeezed between Twin B Joe Fresh (post 5) and Aardie B Miki N (post 7). The latter has won five straight races without defeat including a victory in the \$490,000 Blue Chip Matchmaker at Yonkers on May 9.

Seven Colors has Harris excited about a better season in 2025. The 5-year-old makes his second start of the year in the \$50,000 Send It In Invitational (race 8). "He's going to be a much easier horse to drive this year," said Harris, hoping versatility will give drivers more options.

Seven Colors finished fourth behind Desperate Man in a \$25,000 event at Pocono on May 17 and the two will meet once again in the Send It In on Sunday. Desperate Man took a personal best 1:48 2/5 clocking while regaining winning form for trainer Travis Alexander.

The Send It In field also includes Southwind Gendry (post 3), a \$1.3 million winner from the Ron Burke stable that enters the contest following a 1:47 4/5 victory at The Meadowlands on May 17.

Trainer Tom Cancelliere sends out Maximus Miki (post 7), a 6-year-old that was first or second in 17 of his 23 starts last year and has prepped nicely for his 2025 debut.

Sunday's Harrah's card also includes the \$100,000 Maxie Lee Invitational trot, with Antognoni S (post 1) and Aetos Kronos S (post 2) topping a field of eight, and three divisions of the Pennsylvania Sire Stakes

headlined by last year's Dan Patch Award winner Louprint. The Ron Burke trainee is looking for his third straight win in the Sire Stakes before shipping to Canada for the North America Cup trials on June 7.

The 16-race Harrah's Philadelphia program has a first post of 12:40 p.m. (EDT) and features a \$10,000 Guaranteed Pick 4 starting in race 10.

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Handicappers should err on the side of being studious

One of the nuisances when it comes to wagering on harness racing is learning driver tendencies. While every driver will have you believe that they take each situation differently and can perform well from on or off the pace, they do fall back on certain habits, if you will.

Considering the mindset of drivers is especially important during these late spring and early summer months when 3-year-olds are returning to the races and 2-year-olds will get their first taste of pari-mutuel life.

Ignoring the fact that some drivers are better than others and certain situations will lead to different tactics, in theory we can safely lump each driver into one of three buckets – aggressive, adaptable and conservative. Almost every driver will say they fall into adaptable, but it is my contention that provided no instruction from the trainer on a horse making its first couple of starts of the year especially, most drivers will default to their habitual category.

Since The Meadowlands is my main focus during the year, let's dissect that colony of drivers below. I've included the people who competed in the most 2-year-old races in recent years as well as three of the leading drivers in 2025 who figure to pick up additional drives.

The rankings are relatively self-explanatory. From my perspective, the aggressive drivers are more likely than not to put their horses in play early in the mile or make a strong move to towards front in the middle of the race. This assumes a level playing field. Meaning that if Gingras is driving a horse who doesn't seem to have any early speed, I wouldn't expect him to automatically go hard off the wings of the gate. That said, I expect all of the aggressive drivers to err on the side of aggression. That's really the key term. If there is a choice to make at any point during the mile, a more aggressive driver is less likely to sit along the pylons while a conservative driver is prone to "sitting a trip" in hopes things work out.

At least in my mind, guys in the "conservative" group are going to look to "save" a young horse for the right spots and not use "win at all cost" tactics. Again, this is a general statement and not saying that every circumstance is the same. I have Brett Beckwith under conservative after just a limited sample of races because he's shown to be a bit more careful with young horses like Making History. This could certainly change if his brand grows and he starts getting more opportunities for other stables that cater to 2- and 3-year-olds.

Trying to prove my theory in which drivers belong in which category, I decided to go back and check all of the 2-year-old races at The Meadowlands from the last week in June through the last week in July over the last three years. I recorded every driver who was on the lead at the quarter or half in a race for rookie trotters or pacers. The results were a bit eye-opening and have me rethinking my logic a bit.

With a sample size of approximately 120 races (I didn't record the actual number), the driver whose horses were on the lead the most early in the mile was Dexter Dunn (27 instances). How could one of my conservative drivers lead the way? The more I thought about it, a lot of that likely has to do with who his main clients are in these types of races. Trainers like Nancy Takter or Marcus Melander tend to send their horses out to the track ready to roll and thus Dunn is highly likely to put them in play.

Running down the list, David Miller was next at 23, followed by Todd McCarthy (22), Gingras and Scott Zeron (19), and Tim Tetrick and Andrew McCarthy (18). With much fewer drives, Ake Svanstedt came in at 10 and Andy Miller at seven. Interestingly, Zeron led all drivers with 11 horses leading at either the quarter or half in 2024, so it just goes to show that he's willing to put horses in play when he has the right talent in front of him, even if I still consider him conservative.

So, what conclusions can we make from everything above?

I still believe in my initial list as a general statement but I may have a bit more of an open mind depending on the horse and the barn. For example, nine of the 11 times Zeron was on the lead in 2024 occurred when he drove for the Toscano barn. Maybe he is driving those horses differently than others.

I have to admit that I much prefer an aggressive driver. While in an ideal world bettors would like a perfect drive every time, that scenario simply isn't realistic to expect. Everyone makes mistakes and even the best drivers fall into that category. That said, what we as bettors want most is to get a run for our money. We want to feel like the driver is giving us the best opportunity to win.

When a 3-5 favorite who appears to have some early speed is taken to the back of the pack and does nothing it is frustrating. Perhaps the horse wasn't feeling good that night, but as bettors the only thing we saw is the perceived lack of effort. Remember, perception is reality. If that same horse was placed on the lead (or tried to leave) and ultimately tired to last, bettors would walk away satisfied. I'm not sure drivers take that into account, and in some respects I'm not sure they should. Drivers needs to steer their horses in a way to provide them the best opportunity to win regardless of the odds. There have been plenty of times where a driver took the conservative route and I disagreed with it in the moment but that decision was the sole reason they won. Just as drivers can make errors in judgement, we as onlookers can make similar bad calls.

There is a very fine line between what is good for the bettors and what is best for the connections of the horse. While winning is the ultimate goal of bettors it is not always the case for the connections. Maybe some people want to sweep that fact under the rug, but it is true. In a way that is just another piece to the handicapping puzzle. Some races have 10 pieces and a 4-year-old can figure it out and others have 1,000 pieces and require deeper thought.

Handicapping isn't as simple as looking at the last line and heading to the windows. Bettors need to evaluate everything and consult the value on the odds board or will-pays. Only then should you consider making a wager, whether on a perceived conservative driver or an aggressive one.

The regionalization of the standardbred sport has a way of segregating the sports' best horses while at the same time offering unique opportunities to trainers and owners to maximize the returns on their investments. As programs in Ohio, Pennsylvania, Ontario, New York and most recently Kentucky have grown, the need for horses to step out of their comfort zones has been limited, upending the depth once created by the Grand Circuit. It is not a longing for the past but just a wish that racing fans would have the opportunity to have a reason to root on the home team when regional powers collide.

There are still a few weeks remaining, but the hope is that perhaps June 7 or June 14 will be one of those day(s) where the best horses from North America convene at one track and in one race. While those dates may coincide with the C\$1 million North America Cup at Woodbine Mohawk Park with eliminations followed by the rich final, the hope here comes that the Fan Hanover, the co-feature on the pacing side, provides all the elements of a mustsee event. With still some time for the connections to consider, there is a chance that Canada's reigning Horse of the Year Chantilly would meet the 2024 Dan Patch winner Miki And Minnie along with Ohio champion Odds On Hialeah

for the first time. With double eligibility, the ball is in the court of those making the decisions, with Chantilly double-staked and eligible at this moment to both the North America Cup and Fan Hanover.

Trainer Virgil Morgan Jr. has a pair of extremely talented Ohio-sired fillies in Odds On Hialeah and Odds On Chesapeake. The pair made their sophomore debuts in Ohio Sire Stakes action at Scioto Downs last Friday (May 16) and were equally impressive while dominating.

"I was happy with both of them," said Morgan about the pair before touching on where the fillies would be racing in the future. "There's an Ohio Sire Stakes (June 7 at Northfield Park), so I'm going to have to talk it over with Dana (Parham-Odds on Racing) and see what he wants to do."

Visually, Odds On Hialeah put on an impressive display of speed going first-over with a 26 1/5 burst of speed to clear the lead and open five lengths on her rivals in her debut. A winning margin of just over a length in a quick 1:50 3/5 mile was deceptive.

"Brett (driver Miller) shut her down," said Morgan. "You don't get anything extra for setting track records, so I was very happy about that."

A daughter of Lather Up, the 2018 North America Cup champion, Odds On Hialeah won seven of her eight starts as a freshman, dominating in her home state but giving strong indication that her ability would stretch outside that locale.

"I think she'll be competitive," said Morgan when asked about the potential to race in the Fan Hanover. "She beat a pretty nice filly in Papi Grad at Delaware last year and everyone was talking about that one." Papi Grad had gained plenty of attention in the Pennsylvania Sire Stakes but proved powerless when Odds On Hialeah rolled by her in 1:51 4/5 in the Standardbred Stake.

There are a lot of elements to seeing great races take shape and the nuances of the racing schedule offer only a few times when it's everyone's interest to join the party. To the connections behind these championship-caliber fillies there is already the willingness to double stake and spend extra money just to give them the opportunity. Now it will be a question of which road is taken and whether those roads will cross at Woodbine Mohawk Park in the coming weeks.

Chantilly has the home field advantage as Odds On Hialeah raced exclusively in Ohio last year, and Miki And Minnie did travel but spent a majority of her time in Kentucky and New Jersey while culminating her season with a Breeders Crown title.

While the need to race in Grand Circuit events may be different today than it was 30 years ago, of interest is just how strong some of these Sire Stakes programs have become and how champion-caliber horses need not be defined by location or theoretical strength of sire. Odds On Hialeah is by a young sire in Lather Up.

"I think he's been a lot better than some people expected," said Morgan in defense of the descendant of Bettor's Delight.

While the sons and daughters of Bettor's Delight have been dominant in Ontario, Chantilly's rise to glory has brought along with it the ability of Big Jim to climb out from the shadows and give the Western Idealstallion line voice in Ontario.

The stars may have to align for the race to play out but hopefully Chantilly, Miki And Minnie and Odds On Hialeah will be behind the same starting car at Woodbine Mohawk Park this June 14.

Chantilly also made her 2025 debut last weekend and did so in style, winning the SBOA Final for sophomore pacing fillies in 1:52 with runnerup Millie May Hanover keeping pace with her to the wire but unable to re-rally. Chantilly remained perfect in her career. It's difficult to be critical of any horse making a first start of the season, especially in stakes competition, but questions remain whether a match against colts is really in her best interest at this point in the season. A pair of North America Cup eligibles competed and won on the same card, including the Bettor's Delight-sired Crack Shot, who showed Nijinsky-like power in capturing his SBOA event with driver Doug McNair on obvious cruise control to the wire in a solid 1:51 clocking.

Trainer Chris Ryder is pointing Miki And Minnie for the Fan Hanover and unlike the other connections has no conflicts to consider. The Always B Miki-sired filly has made just one start this year and that came on May 12 when she overcame post eight to win a Pennsyl-

vania All Stars event at Pocono in a crisp 1:51 mile.

Miki And Minnie is eligible in Pennsylvania and Kentucky, so the Fan Hanover may be one of the only chances she'll have this year to meet Chantilly, at least prior to the Breeders Crown, which is why the hope for a potential rivalry looms so large in June.

Morgan also believes that Odds On Chesapeake has the talent to go beyond Ohio but the Downbytheseaside-sired filly has a broader stakes package that could prove more lucrative. "She's dual eligible in Kentucky," Morgan said, giving rise to the thought that she could be meeting

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Fixing the Harness Racing Triple Crown

It didn't take long after the announcement that Sovereignty would skip the Preakness Stakes for the debate on whether or not the Thoroughbred Triple Crown should be changed to create more time between each of the three legs.

Thoroughbred racing faces a much different problem than Standardbred racing. For the Thoroughbred industry, its Triple Crown is by far the most watched event in the sport. Its success is critical to the overall health of the industry and the recent trend of fewer Kentucky Derby horses and even those winners skipping the Preakness has created a divide within the industry. That split seems to be binary. You either want the Triple Crown to remain the same or you want the races more spread out over a longer period of time.

The Standardbred issue focuses on the lack of brand awareness. It adds little to the overall health of the sport and there are many people who wager on harness racing who couldn't tell you what three races make up the pacing and trotting Triple Crowns. In fact, I wouldn't be surprised if someone reading this column may not know.

For those wondering, the trotting Triple Crown is comprised of the Hambletonian, Yonkers Trot and the Kentucky Futurity. The pacing Triple Crown is made up of the Messenger, the Cane Pace and the Little Brown Jug.

In 2025, harness racing implemented a graded stakes program for the first time and that is where this conversation needs to begin. A race should not be a part of the Triple Crown series if it does not maintain Grade One status. This year, the Hambletonian and Kentucky Futurity both carry purses to achieve that Grade One status, the Yonkers Trot has not. Based on the rules put in place, the final of the Yonkers Trot falls \$50,000 short of the required \$350,000 for the race to be considered for Grade One status. On the pacing side, neither the Messenger Stakes nor the Cane Pace reached Grade One status due to their purses also falling short of the \$350,000 requirement.

If a racetrack does not want to add more money to the purse of a stakes race, that is fine of course, but it should be a requirement of the Triple Crown that all of its races must be at least \$350,000.

In addition, these tracks should work together to promote the Triple Crown series. Assuming the races remain the same, The Meadowlands, Yonkers, The Red Mile and The Delaware County Fair should build a television series around the Triple Crown, all contributing financing to fund the event. The racetracks should pursue a sponsor of the event in which a bonus is given to a horse who sweeps the series, perhaps a lesser bonus in a non-Triple Crown year for the horse who performs best across the series. This can be done by allotting points to each horse based on their finishing position in each race and the horse with the highest point total wins the bonus. All of the above could increase participation in the events, something that is clearly needed based on the five-horse field in the Cane Pace last year.

When the debate came up around the importance of grading stakes in harness racing, one argument was "on the list of things that need to be fixed, how important is this?" I imagine the same question will be raised related to my concerns around the Triple Crown. But we opened this door by grading our stakes races and I don't think the industry can accept Grade Two races being included in the Triple Crown.

This should be viewed as an opportunity to make changes that will help the Triple Crown. Furthermore, harness racing has a big advantage over the Thoroughbreds and that is the frequency in which horses race. Right now, the Thoroughbred industry is splintered over the question of whether the Preakness should be held two weeks after the Kentucky Derby because of the lack of participation in the middle leg of the series. Harness Racing does not have that same issue when it comes to the timing of the races. If all the events carried Grade One status – making them some of the richest races in their division each year – and carried a bonus program, large and competitive fields would not be an issue at all.

The industry really needs to decide what the Triple Crown should be. If it continues on its current path, then it is sadly almost an afterthought. As Thoroughbred racing has shown, if marketed correctly, a Triple Crown series can help an industry. These are some rather simple ways to promote and enhance the event for harness racing. Is it harness racing's biggest problem? Of course not, but it is a rather simple one to fix, so why not fix it?

R Melina to make season's debut in Miss Versatility at The Meadowlands

R Melina is the type of horse that is difficult to evaluate from appearance alone. But after leading all 3-year-old female trotters in earnings last season, and ranking as the division's co-fastest performer, it is clear there is more to her than meets the eye.

"She's a hard horse to judge," trainer John Butenschoen said. "She's not imposing to look at. When you sit behind her, until you really ask her to go, there is nothing that stands out. You don't sit behind her and think she's a powerhouse or a brute like some other horses that I've had.

"But it's what she does when she faces competition. She's one that's always there. You ask her to do something, and she does it. She keeps going and she doesn't get tired. When she's in a race and somebody comes at her or she goes at somebody, she takes off. She just can do it. She kind of tricks you a little bit that way."

Last year, R Melina hit the board in 14 of 18 races, winning eight and earning \$817,469 for Butenschoen and owners M And L of Delaware and Armitage Farm. She won the Kentucky Filly Futurity in 1:50 1/5, equaling the fastest mile of the season for a sophomore female trotter, and also counted the New York Sire Stakes championship, a division of the Delvin Miller Memorial, and a Hambletonian Oaks elimination among her triumphs.

In addition, the daughter of Chapter Seven-Goodtogo Hanover finished second in the Breeders Crown, Matron Stakes and Empire Breeders Classic, and was third in the Elegantimage Stakes.

"She showed up every week," Butenschoen said. "The thing that I like about Melina is she's raced on every sized racetrack, any kind of racetrack, and she can do it. It's kind of fun to have one like that."

R Melina went off stride in three of her off-the-board finishes last season, including the season-ending FanDuel Mare Trot championship against older rivals in late November at The Meadowlands, but the trainer said he shared in the responsibility.

"I think I messed up a couple starts by having her over-rigged because she could kind of be aggressive," Butenschoen said. "We just had to tinker around.

"I take a little bit of blame for her last start when she made a mistake at The Meadowlands. We had good results when I pulled her shoes in the Kentucky (Filly) Futurity and then the Breeders Crown. I tried the same against the aged mares, but that track was a little different track later in the year. She warmed up good, but the temperature dropped and the track kind of froze up a little bit. It was a judgement call that I made. In hindsight, I was kicking myself a little bit."

R Melina returns to The Meadowlands on Saturday for her first start as a 4-year-old. She will meet nine rivals in the \$40,000 opening leg of the Miss Versatility Series for older female trotters. The field includes 2024 FanDuel winner Nelsonbriteagle NO, millionaire M-M's Dream, and multiple stakes-winner Elista Hanover, also making her 4-year-old debut.

Butenschoen gave R Melina two qualifiers ahead of Saturday's race. She won the first in 1:56 3/5 at Mohegan Pennsylvania's Pocono Downs on May 7 and the most recent on May 17 at The Meadowlands in 1:52 4/5 with a 26 4/5 last quarter.

"She seems really good," Butenschoen said. "You kind of always hold your breath coming back because you just don't know how much the 3-year-old year took out of them, and are they bigger and strong enough to go against the older ones?

"But so far, she's had two nice qualifiers. At Pocono, we got the right kind of mile into her that we wanted to see and then Todd (driver McCarthy) was able to keep her in a hole and sprint her off cover the other day in a pretty nice mile. All things considered, she's on schedule and acting as good as she did last year. Fingers crossed."

In addition to the Miss Versatility, The Meadowlands on Saturday will host the New Jersey Sire Stakes championships for 3-year-old male and female pacers, plus the first-round divisions of the NJSS for 3-year-old male and female trotters.

Racing begins at 6:20 p.m. (EDT) at The Meadowlands.

Saunders eyes another 'A' effort from Manolete in NJSS final

Manolete is the type of horse who always strives to deliver a top effort, and trainer Bruce Saunders is expecting nothing less when the colt gets behind the starting gate for Saturday's (May 24) \$225,000 New Jersey Sire Stakes championship for 3-year-old male pacers at The Meadowlands.

Ranked No. 7 in Dave Little's Road to the Meadowlands Pace Top 10, Manolete has finished no worse than second in 13 of 16 career races, winning six and earning \$250,993. In his two NJSS preliminary starts this season, he missed by a nose on May 3 and posted a career-best 1:50.3 victory on May 10 at The Big M.

In Saturday's final, Manolete will leave from post one with driver Scott Zeron. He is the 3-1 second choice on the morning line behind Noel Daley's Smooth Dream at 2-1.

"Manolete is going into the race in good shape," said Saunders, who trains the son of Cattlewash-Glancewithme for owners M And L of Delaware and M & M Harness Racing. "The week off did him good. He always brings his 'A' game, so we're all looking forward to it.

"He's just a terrific horse. He loves his job, loves his life. I think that's part of the reason he shows up. His caretaker (Doreen Dailey) pampers him like a pet, and he responds."

Last year, Manolete had five wins and five seconds in 12 races. He won both of his NJSS prelims and finished second by a head against McCusker in the final. In his next start, he was second to Captain Optimistic in the New Jersey Classic.

Two of Manolete's victories in 2024 were on the Grand Circuit, including a division of the Kindergarten Classic Series. He was second to Papis Pistol in the Kindergarten final.

This year, Manolete was sixth against older horses in his seasonal debut, then second to Smooth Dream in the Home Grown Pace prior to his NJSS starts.

"He's not going to win every race," Saunders said. "He's not going to be 1-2-3 every race. But I know for a fact he'll show up and do his very best. That's the kind of horse he is."

Saunders said last year that Manolete might have been the smartest 2-year-old he ever trained.

"That hasn't changed," Saunders said. "He's really intelligent. From day one, he knew exactly what to do.

"He's a little bit more of a man this year as opposed to a boy. He doesn't do anything stupid, but he doesn't mind expressing himself or hollering at the girls. He makes sure they know he's there. But once he gets his gear on, he forgets all that and is focused on his job."

Manolete's stakes list, aside from the Meadowlands Pace, includes the MGM Grand Messenger at MGM Yonkers Raceway, Tompkins-Geers and Cane Pace at The Big M, and Matron and Progress Pace at Bally's Dover.

"We chose to stay close to home," Saunders said. "There is plenty of money here if we are good enough to get it. I think we did the right thing for our horse."

Manolete and Smooth Dream both head into Saturday's NJSS final off wins. Smooth Dream, who will leave from post eight with driver Todd McCarthy, is undefeated in four races this season. Making History, who nipped Manolete in the event's first round, is the 4-1 third choice from post three with Brett Beckwith in the sulky for trainer Tony Alagna.

"Noel's horse was — and maybe still is — the best of the group, and there are several other horses that are viable in this event," Saunders said. "Making History, when it became a brush race, used his quick speed to brush past us (in the first round). I don't think it's going to be a brush race this time, I think there is going to be continuous action because there are so many horses with speed that are on the outside.

"It's going to be an interesting race. With the rail, Scott only has to look to his right side to see what's going on and make his decision. We have a lot of confidence in Scott. He's familiar with our horse and, to a certain extent, he'll determine how fast the fractions are based on what he's got in his mind, or how fast we push off the gate as well. But our guy will be ready."

In Saturday's \$225,000 NJSS final for 3-year-old female pacers, defending series champion Reckless Abandon is the 9-5 morning line favorite. She won her second-round start in the event by a head over Worklifebalance after finishing second by a head against Beach Babe in the first round. Reckless Abandon will leave from post six with Todd McCarthy driving for trainer Brett Pelling.

Saturday's Big M card also includes first-round NJSS action for 3-yearold male and female trotters, plus the first leg of the Miss Versatility Series for older female trotters.

Racing begins at 6:20 p.m. (EDT) at The Meadowlands.

EARLY HAMBLETONIAN FAVORITE MARYLAND RETURNS

Maryland, the Hambletonian winter book favorite, is set to make his 2025 debut in the first qualifier on Saturday at The Meadowlands and will face one of his main competitors in Go Dog Go.

Other horses entered include stakes winners Blank, Voguish, Captain Optimistic (also in-to-go Sunday at Harrah's Philadelphia), My Sweet Lily, Funtime Bayama and two-time Dan Patch Award winner Captain Albano.

Post time for the Saturday qualifying card is 9:00 AM (EDT) and can be streamed live on the track's website.



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State Assembly Speaker Coughlin Visits Fair Winds Farm in NJ

New Jersey State Assembly Speaker Craig Coughlin on Monday (May 19) visited Fair Winds Farm, where he met with members of the Standardbred community to hear concerns regarding a proposed cut to the state's annual appropriation for horse racing purses in the fiscal year 2026 budget.

Gov. Phil Murphy's budget proposal for 2026 includes a \$10 million appropriation for purses, a reduction from the \$20 million provided in previous years. The appropriation was first introduced in 2019 as part of a five-year, \$100 million allocation that has been renewed in subsequent years with the vital support of Speaker Coughlin.

This past September, Gov. Murphy signed a bill to extend the \$20 million funding for purses through fiscal year 2029, but he noted the state Constitution only allows the governor and legislators to budget revenues and expenditures strictly on an annual basis.

"Consequently, the appropriations that this bill purports to require through State fiscal year 2029 are not binding and serve only as a strong expression of intent to provide funding in future fiscal years," the governor said at the time in a statement.

An economic impact study last year, completed with assistance from the SBOANJ, showed horse racing generated \$75 million annually in tax revenue for New Jersey.

Speaker Coughlin's visit to Fair Winds Farm, which included a lunch reception and fundraiser, was hosted by the Standardbred Breeders & Owners Association of New Jersey and the state's Standardbred industry's political action committee TrotPAC.

Among those joining Speaker Coughlin for Monday's event were SBOANJ President Mark Ford as well as fellow officers Mark Mullen, Linda Toscano, and Al Ochsner. The group also included SBOANJ directors Dan Baer, Stephen Dey III, Mike Gulotta, Julie Meirs, Julie Miller, and Chris Ryder. Other industry representatives included John Campbell, Gunjan Patel and Nadia Tarnawa from the Hambletonian Society, Jason Settlemoir from The Meadowlands, and Karyn Malinowski from the Rutgers Equine Science Center.

"We are grateful for Speaker Coughlin's time and continued interest in our industry," Ford said. "We had productive discussions with the Speaker, with a number of people coming out to talk with him about the impact of the appropriations over the years. There is no question the funding has strengthened our industry and fostered growth, whether it be in breeding or racing, while also provide value to the state."

At the conclusion of the visit, Speaker Coughlin took a trip to Fair Winds' nearby yearling farm to catch up with his Andy Miller Stable-bred namesake, trotter Speaker Craig, and watch the horse with other yearlings in the field. Fair Winds Farm's Heather Zitone and Julie Miller provided Speaker Coughlin with additional insight about how young horses are raised.

A Democrat representing the 19th Legislative District in Middlesex County, Speaker Coughlin has served in the State Assembly since 2010. Speaker Coughlin's responsibilities include scheduling meetings and determining which bills will be considered within the Assembly.
