Involve Parents and Guardians

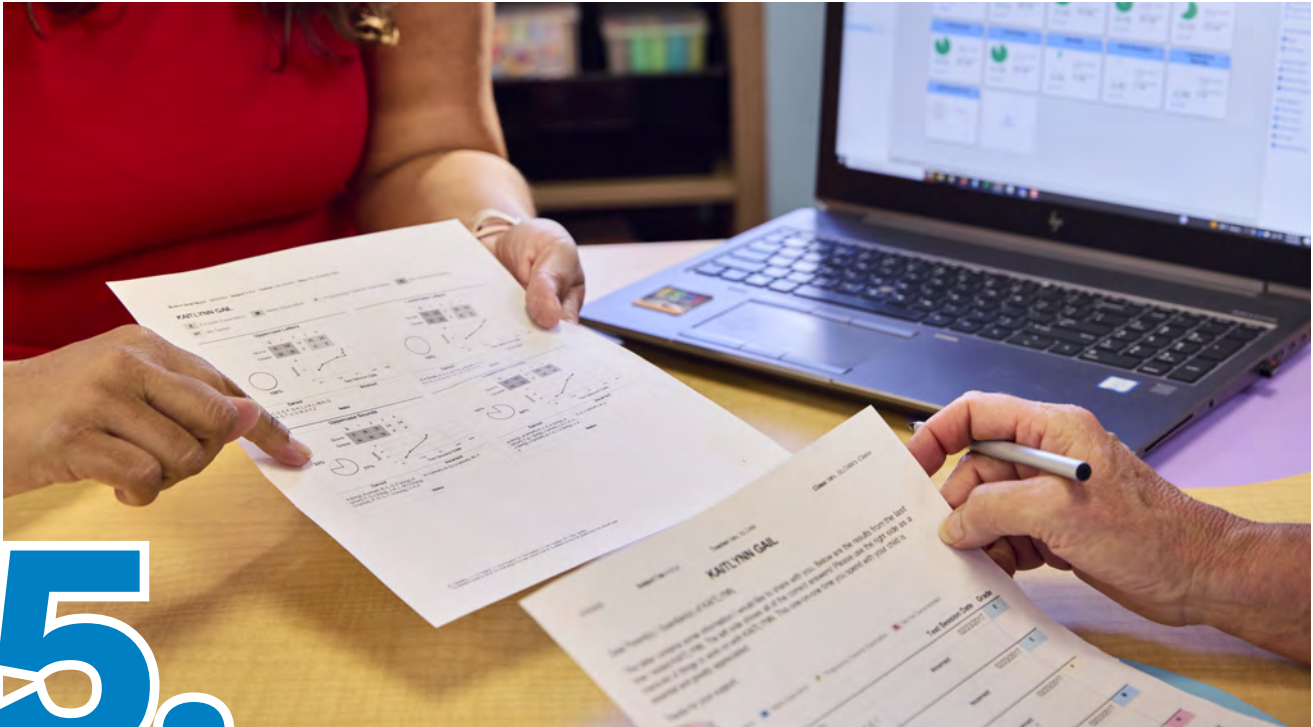
