

# Preparing your research for publication

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# Start your publication plan early...

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- **What, Why, Where, When** and **Who** will publish the project findings?
- Authorship group
  - Substantial contributions to the completion or design of the work or the acquisition, analysis or interpretation of the data
  - Drafting work or revising it critically for important intellectual content
  - Final approval of the version to be published
  - Agreement to be accountable for all aspects of the work – including accuracy, integrity etc.

# Getting it ready

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- What is the statement of the problem that your research sought to address?
  - What is known about the topic?
  - What is the existing knowledge gap?
  - How does your study aim to bridge or contribute to filling the gap in knowledge?
- What is **central focus** of your research?
- How do the findings of your research advance knowledge in your chosen research or practice area?
- Implications of your research for future research investigations

# Choosing a publication

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- Think about the main publications in your area of research/practice
- What journals are cited most often in your area of research?
- Check SCIMAGO and AIMS, SCOPE and KEY WORDS for the journal
- Send it to a journal that will be read by your colleagues
- If you are not sure....most publications have an editorial team that will let you know if your article fits their publication or not

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- Follow the rules set out for you by the publication...
- Edit, edit, edit...
- Map out your drafts according to the guidelines...

## Author Guidelines

This journal participates in the Wiley [Developmental Science Publishing Network](#). This exciting collaboration between a number of high quality journals simplifies and speeds up the publication process, helping authors find a home for their research. At the Editors' judgement, suitable papers not accepted by one journal may be recommended for referral to another journal(s) in the network. Authors decide whether to accept the referral, with the option to transfer their paper with or without revisions. Once the referral is accepted, submission happens automatically, along with any previous reviewer reports, thereby relieving pressure on the peer review process. While a transfer does not guarantee acceptance, it is more likely to lead to a successful outcome for authors by helping them to find a route to publication quickly and easily.

The journal to which you are submitting your manuscript employs a plagiarism detection system. By submitting your manuscript to this journal you accept that your manuscript may be screened for plagiarism against previously published works.

# Mapping out your publication



Check for any word limits for different types of research



Drafting up the structure – use the headings from the author instructions and check for any specific information required



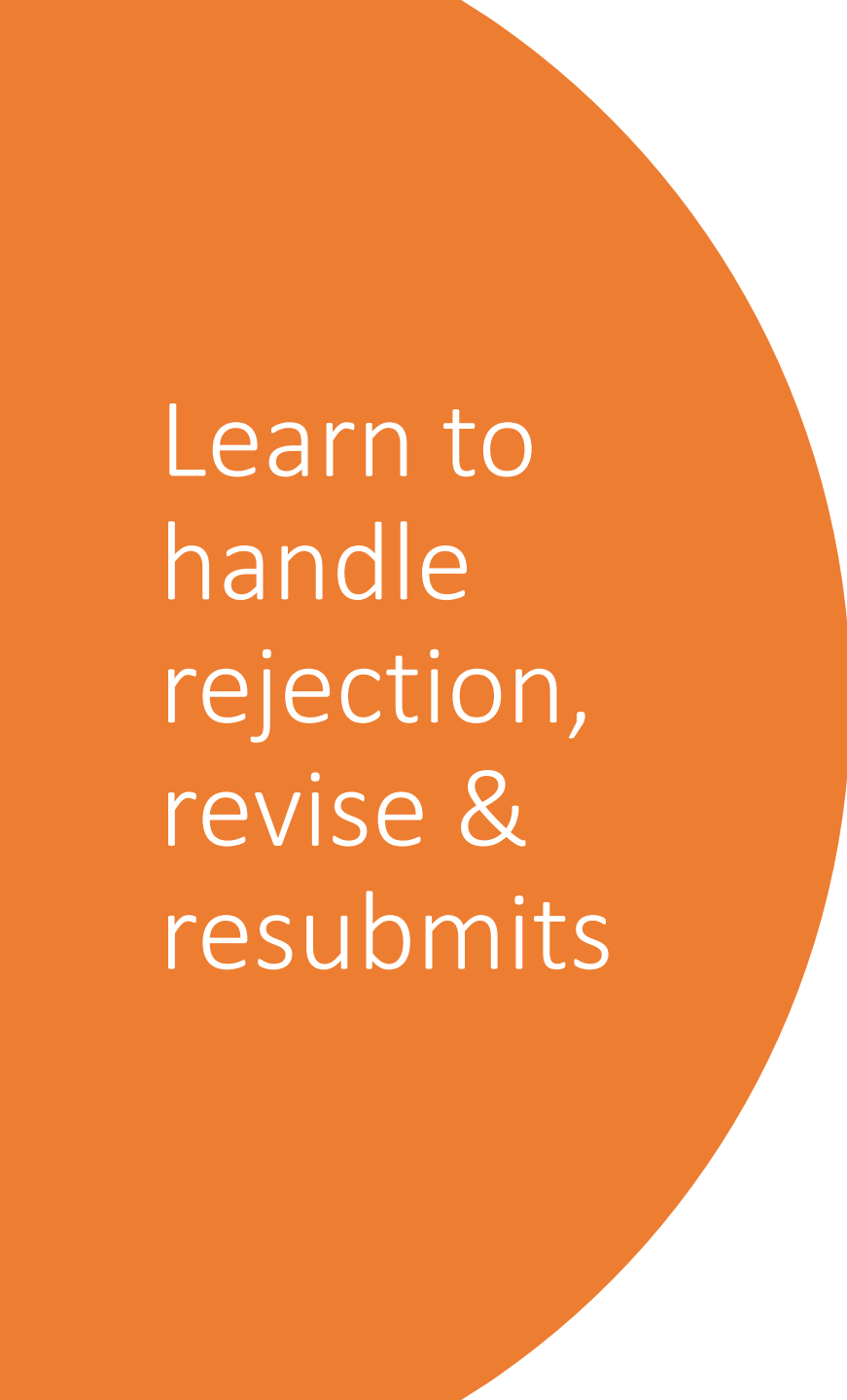
Begin to transfer your project across to the structure given by the publication




Set up a folder for the draft manuscript, tables figures etc.

# Learn to handle rejection, revise & resubmits

- Peer review – positive and negative feedback – get used to it!
  - Some publications will reject your paper
  - Reject and re-submit
  - Some publications will reject and recommend another publication
  - Progress to peer-review
  - Major and minor amendments
  - Acceptance of paper
  - Getting the word out about your paper.
