
A few updates and changes based on yesterday's forecast.

Biggest snowstorm of the season for Chicago 2/25-2/26

Significant storm for Chicago area tomorrow into Wednesday morning

Potent and windy storm will move in tomorrow night, bringing Chicago and most parts of Illinois and lower Michigan their largest snowfall of the season. Will start out as rain and transition into snow late Tuesday, with Wednesday morning probably being the toughest travel time in the area. Delays and slow travel should be expected midweek for most of the Midwest.




Some things to consider when there is extreme weather:

- Most LTL carriers will operate in limited capacity (at some points even closing terminals). Even if freight is picked up, it may not move from the local terminal.
- Truckload carriers will likely operate as long as they feel it is safe for their drivers, however, we would recommend accounting for an additional day in transit to allow for delays.
- Consider the path of the shipment. If it is heading through an impacted area, it is likely your shipment may get caught in a delay.
- If you choose to upgrade service, be aware that weather delays are considered “acts of God” and could still cause delays in a shipment.

If you have a critical shipment, communicate with your CHR team as soon as possible. We will do everything in our power to create a plan that avoids any major disruption.
